Did you know that Earth Day is celebrating 55 years of worldwide acknowledgement. Millions of people from every country participate each year. Now this sounds like quite an accomplishment. But think again. Our planet is almost 4 billion years old. It has taken us a long, long time to appreciate "Mother Earth" and the danger that she faces in the next hundred years.

We are being buried in plastic. **BUT** it is not what we can see that is alarming. It is what we cannot see that is a matter of great concern.

In this edition we will focus on what science finally finds out about micro and nano plastic particles lodged in our bodies. Opinion on Federal Department of Education

Peg Dunmire has written an opinion on the recent Department of Education policies. She knows that her opinion may result in opposing opinions. She wants to start a discussion' Her words are

"This is as good a time as ever to have the public involved in determining how much we invest in education. Let the discussion begin".

Her opinions may have several political implications in today's environment. As a result, an editorial decision has been made. The first paragraph of her opinion article is printed below. Her full article will be sent to the Administrators of the L.P. Forum where similar discussions take place and other comments are included.

Unfortunately, the rhetoric about the Department of Education is very misleading. As a former School Board Director, I share the goal of local control of our schools. And that has been the historical policy of our country. The Department of Education was established in 1867 to gather data and statistics on the nation's schools. That continues to be one of the main objectives of federal involvement. In the 1950's the nation feared Russia's launch of Sputnik as a wake up call to the US for improving our education. In addition, the Supreme Court ruled against "Equal but Separate Schools" and began the civil rights implementation in our schools. And finally, President Johnson began the "War on Poverty." These three monumental changes in our country's culture resulted in wide expansion of the federal involvement in education.

The expansion consisted of civil rights implementation e.g. Title I, II, III, etc. Funding for disadvantaged students and schools followed the expansion of Medicaid and the War on Poverty. Secondary education loans and grants was an expansion of education into colleges and community colleges support.

By dismantling The Department of Education, the federal government will continue to be very involved in these 4 areas: data collection, civil rights compliance, redistribution of taxes for the poor and support for secondary education (colleges).



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AN ACCIDENT – Has it ever happened to you?



Today is a beautiful day and I am down in the dumps. My car is sitting in my driveway. Undrivable. I was hit on the driver's side of the car Friday (March 30th) evening. I am fine. But I am down in the dumps.

When I was hit, I swerved to maintain control of the car as it twisted and slid across the road. The car came to a rest in the middle of the road. Cars continued to pass me on the opposite side of the road. Zoom. Zoom. I thought I'd better get off this road before I got hit again. I drove to the right as far as I could go but there was no room to get off of the road. I put my emergency lights on. I was totally alone. Cars all around me swishing and swerving to miss me. The outside world was dark. Inside my car, I was just sitting in the car wondering what to do. Call 911. I did. The operator asked which services I needed. I didn't know. I had just been hit. Did I need medical assistance? I had been tossed around the driver's seat but the seat belt kept me somewhat in one place. I remember feeling tossed to the right and to the left but I didn't know if I were hurt. Do I need a police officer? Well sure! Send someone

please. At this point, I didn't even know if the person who hit me was still around. So I just sat in the dark waiting.

A knock at the passenger's window. I was alone on the side of the road. Darkness. Should I open the window? Gingerly, I rolled down the window. The gentleman who hit me came to assure me that he was fully insured. He apologized. He said he didn't even see me. At the very last second, he saw me and stomped on his brakes. He thinks that helped to turn his car so he hit me somewhat sideways instead of full on. He explained he was taking medicine to his son who couldn't be near the newborn baby. He was a mess.

I assured him, we would be fine. This was an accident. That is why we have insurance. I imagined his stress: a new father; a sick son; and he just hit a car. Who was more stressed? Him or me?

The police officer came. We exchanged information. I called Nina. I asked her to come. I didn't know what I was going to do. The officer suggested I drive the car to the end of the block and get off the road and park the car in a parking lot. Slowly I drove the car and did get off the road.

Eventually, I drove the car home slowly. Nina followed me. I had to crawl out of the passenger window to get out of the car. I reported the claim to my insurance company. I don't really want to do anything more.



GARDENER'S CORNER

Gardening on your balcony

Many Legacy Pointe residents would like to grow something but do not want to garden outside. So, the Gardener's Corner will try to offer suggestions for things you can grow on your balcony.

If you are new to gardening let's start off easily. How about a tomato plant, a pepper plant, 2 green bean plants, and some lettuce plants.

The transfer days moving the seedlings from starter containers to large pots is done in APRIL. NOW DO IT.

Contact Frank Russo at 407-341-7622 to ask for help.

Here is what you will need to transfer to a large pot. (DO NOT SPEND MUCH MONEY)

You will need a large pot to transfer seedlings. (Buy large pails/buckets at Dollar Tree based on the number of seeds you are transplanting. These cost \$1.25 each versus what you would spend at a nursery which could cost \$10 each. Punch 3 holes in the bottom of each bucket for drainage and you have your pot for growing each of your plants.

You will need a bag or more of garden soil and some potting soil. to mix with the garden soil. (The size bag depends on what weight you can carry). (Ace Hardware has smaller bags which are easier to carry.)

You will also need some fertilizer. A small bag for vegetables is fine.

Be careful in transferring your plants so that you do not damage the fragile roots. When finished put a half teaspoon of fertilizer in the soil of each pot

Two weeks ago, I finished transferring my plants to buckets with holes in the bottom. They are all doing fine. My beans are starting to have flowers.




Our Book for April 15 is called The Women by Kristin Hannah
