The new UCF bus route by Sal and Mitch Mitchel

On a cold and wintry morning at exactly 8:15 AM, Monday, January 22, 2024 our intrepid travelers, Sally and Larry Mitchell, set forth on their journey to the Alafaya Trail aboard the newly commissioned "UCF/Legacy Bus", which was on its maiden voyage. Read what happened next in their own words (Tom Nixon)

"THINK OUTSIDE THE BUS" --- A Tall Tale of Traveling --- by Sal and Mitch

Good day, Legacy Pointe! Today — Monday, January 22nd — was the kickoff of our new UCF bus service! Meet Khristopher (Christopher with a "K"!), an engaging and highly experienced 'gent' who will be our dedicated five-day-a-week driver.

Today our "ride" is in a dedicated 20-passenger bus that is a very nice, cushy transport. It is a wheelchair equipped with automatic lift. With wheelchairs aboard the bus will accommodate two wheelchairs and 16 passengers. This bus will be on the "run" every day but Tuesday.

On Tuesday the bus that will used will be a larger UCF bus to accommodate riders attending LIFE. This bus will carry 36 passengers; with two wheelchairs it will carry either 28 or 30. Just for your information, all UCF buses are wheelchair equipped.

Our scheduled departure was at 8:15. The first stop on this initial journey was Publix. While stopped there Kristopher did a test "run" of the wheelchair lift at the drop-off point. OK, bad terminology! Not drop off! Rather, "Lift off!."

After Publix, on to Dollar Tree! Check out the other shops and restaurants in this shopping center. Stop off for shopping and lunch, and then jump back aboard on the next bus a couple of hours later!

Next on the journey is the UCF Health Clinic, the first of two UCF campus stops. During this period Kristopher related some stories from his time as a school bus driver in Colorado Springs, Colorado — especially for middle schoolers. One middle schooler was memorable in that each day when he boarded the bus he would ask some random question. To wit "Have you taught your cat about gun safety?" (Khristopher later finds out that there is a book "How to Talk to Your Cat About Safety: And Abstinence, Drugs, Satanism, and Other Dangers That Threaten Their Nine Lives."). Such is the life of a professional bus driver!

Next, and final, stop (before getting back to Legacy Pointe, of course) is the UCF Student Union. To and from the Student Union you will have the chance to see some of the UCF campus and its sorority and fraternity row.

We were at each stop along the route for 10 to 15 minutes, depending on traffic. If you are quick and wearing track shoes you MIGHT have time to dash in to buy two bananas or a happy face balloon,

depending on location.

We arrived back at Legacy Pointe at 9:55, the end of our expedition - slightly less than a two-hour journey— the initial UCF-Legacy Pointe run! The bus is comfy and Kristopher is engaging and a great tour guide.

Check your bus schedules closely for the "ride-of-the-day" hit list. There are a wide variety of destinations. You might not have a "need" to ride the bus during this three-month trial period, but jump aboard to get off campus, gab and take a look at the world around us without having to take your eyes off the road!

Windows 11

What about WIN 11 and Microsoft Outlook 2024? On September 21, 2023, Micro Soft announced the availability of the "new" Outlook for Windows for personal accounts through the Microsoft Store on Windows 11 and the Sept. 26 Windows fall update. It is a free app for Windows users designed to help you easily connect and coordinate your various email accounts and calendars in one place. It is intended to take advantage of the latest trends in Artificial Intelligence (AI). You will be able to write clear concise emails and get intelligent suggestions with built-in AI, seamlessly and securely attach important documents and photos to any note, and access OneDrive files and Office web apps without a subscription. Some current devices upgrading to Windows 11 and newly purchased Windows devices running Windows 11 will have the "new" Outlook pre-installed.

The "new" Outlook for Windows will include email and a calendar for each different email account. It will be free (with ads) for everyone with a Windows account and will replace all Windows Mail, Calendar, and People apps by the end of 2024. The "new" Outlook for Windows is designed to run on all Android and Apple products.

As we eagerly anticipate the construction of very own pickleball courts, this article will catch on the progress made to date and make a prediction of <u>When Pickleball</u> will arrive at Legacy Pointe. Let's look at the details of securing the required county permits and uncover the timeline.

In the first week of January 2024, Bert Francis, the CCRC Development Corporation chairman, signed the Seminole County

Planning and Development Department initial application forms, marking a successful start to the process.

On January 24, a significant milestone was reached when the St. Johns River Water Management District issued the permit for the stormwater engineering component of our application.

The current permitting phase involves thorough reviews and recommendations from various county departments, including Planning and Development, Public Safety/Fire Marshal, and Public Works. By February 17, we can expect recommendations and comments to be relayed to the county's Project Manager.

The issuance of the construction permit is estimated to take 60 days if no modifications or changes are needed after the February 17 review. In case any adjustments are necessary, our engineer will swiftly address them to ensure a seamless continuation of the process.

Excitement is building as AAA Court Construction, our chosen contractor, has expressed readiness to start construction with minimal notice. The estimated cost for the project is



\$52,400. The funds to build the courts have been donated by members of the Legacy Pointe Pickleball Club, showcasing their commitment and enthusiasm to bring our courts to life.

Once construction commences, our pickleball courts should be ready for play this summer. As we inch closer to completion, we'll collectively decide on the paint colors for the courts, allowing us to infuse our

community spirit into this exciting project.

Bonus note: "Mayo Clinic Study Suggests Pickleball Contributes To Longevity."

Recent peer-reviewed studies linking racket sports to healthy longevity are particularly relevant to the senior population. A Mayo Clinic study found that playing racket sports increased the life expectancy of participants by between 6 and nearly 10 years. Pickleball requires balance, coordination, and mental agility. Socializing while playing these sports likely enhances the known benefits of exercise. These results align with previous large studies published by The Journal of the American Medical Association, the Copenhagen City Heart Study, and The British Journal of Sports Medicine. RESIDENT EDITORIALS

RECYCLING by Frank Russo

This topic has been raised on and off since we moved into L.P. in March of 2022. The Men's Group representatives met with the former Executive Director, Domenica Wehmann, on the subject of recycling. Domenica said that she had looked into the issue of recycling with the

County and was told that they looked upon Legacy Pointe as 'private property' and would not send the trucks into L.P.

This explanation by the County as reported by Domenica seemed a bit 'lame' since in many Counties in Florida trucks are sent into 'gated' communities to collect recyclables. Are these 'gated' communities also 'private property'?

That issue aside we should look at the whole process of recycling and what can be recycled. Obviously 'gold' and 'silver' are great for recycling, resulting in a significant increase in our pocket change. But in this article, we will look at materials that we go through every day to see what can be done about recycling.

Good News - There is still a strong recycling market for Cardboard and Aluminum cans.

Paper – Newspaper recycling has increased from 21.3 percent in 1980 to 68.2 percent in 2018. Used paper has many uses in a new life and requires far fewer resources to change its original footprint.

After that recycling centers are very selective.

Plastic - Let's start with "plastic". According to National Geographic, only 6% of all plastic in the U.S. is recycled each year. Of the 40 million tons of plastic waste generated in the United States last year, only five to six percent—or about two million tons—was recycled, Even China does not want our plastics. So, plastic is populating our planet's landfills and oceans faster than our human population grows.

Plastic bottles are one part of the 'plastic problem' but some of these can be recycled. The biggest problem is single-use plastic such as grocery bags, and plastic wrapping on everything from meat, produce, baked goods, etc.

What can we at Legacy Pointe do regarding recycling? Here are some suggestions:

- 1. Make sure we are recycling all cardboard. It cannot be sent down our rubbish bins. Cardboard is collected separately. What happens to it at L.P.? Is it being recycled?
- 2. What can we do with our newspapers? They have a value on the recycling market
- 3. We should support anyone who collects aluminum cans for recycling! (See the article below from Mitch Mitchell)
- 4. Take your own bags to the grocery store. This will help immensely!
- 5. Plastic drink bottles are a major problem. They can be recycled but nobody wants to collect them. In Massachusetts where I come from there is a State 'bottle law'. Every drink bottle and some others have a deposit placed on them when sold. When a customer returns the bottle to the place of purchase they get a refund. The place of purchase has recycling machines that reduce the bottle to pellets and these can be sold to companies that recycle drink bottles. Some people are bottle collectors for a profit. You will never see a plastic drink bottle on the street.
- 6. Reduce our dependence on plastic rather than recycling plastic.

Recycling Preview Article by Mitch Mitchell

"In mid-October last year, a couple of residents kicked off a trial for recycling aluminum cans from the main dining room and Bistro. The staff responded enthusiastically and about 1,100-1,200 cans a month are being recovered. VERY shortly this recovery effort will extend to the IL building using the floor trash rooms and the cart room on the 1st floor near the door exit to parking. In addition, a similar effort will also start for the recovery of dangerous LITHIUM batteries. More detailed information on both is forthcoming (or maybe are already "out there" by the time you read this)!

To make these recovery efforts work, volunteers will be needed: it won't require much time on a weekly basis, but it will be "steady work" on a continuing basis. As always, "many hands make light work." 


