

The Theme for Earth Day 2024 is "Planet vs. Plastics"

Starting with Earth Day 2024 the LP Independent Times has been focusing on the theme for this year "Planet vs. Plastics". We have all seen pictures of piles of plastic in every form littering our landfills, our waterway, and in every trash pickup worldwide. We are being buried in plastic.

Do You wonder "why"

The LP Independent Times has been writing so many articles on plastics. Well, in addition to plastic bags and bottles being dumped everywhere on this planet we

are now finding out that the residue of plastic namely micro and nano plastic – particles so small that special electronic microscopes are needed to detect them - are everywhere in our bodies and scientists are just beginning to understand how they are affecting our health.

Here is one study published in the Journal <u>Health</u> December 2024 By <u>Jess Cockerill</u>

An international team of researchers pooled findings from over 1,700 existing studies from 38 different countries investigating links between people's exposure to chemicals and certain health impacts.

The suspects in question – BPA (<u>bisphenol A</u>), DEHP (<u>di(2-ethylhexyl)</u> <u>phthalate</u>) and PBDEs (<u>polybrominated diphenyl ethers</u>) – have been previously associated with serious health issues.

Animal studies have shown its potential as an endocrine disruptor, affecting pregnancy in mice and puberty in rats.

As Seniors all of us want our children and grandchildren to have a long and healthy life. By being informed and helping them to be informed about the dangers of these particles we can be on the leading edge of scientific findings before it is too late.

Look at the history of dangerous chemicals that we have already experienced in our lifetime – DDT, Nicotine, Asbestos, and now Forever Chemicals. Remember for a long time we were assured that these were safe. Doctors smoked! These 'forever plastic chemicals' are not safe!

We may have escaped any exposure to DDT, Nicotine, and Asbestos but the abundance of plastics containing the 'forever chemicals' are everywhere and that includes every one of our bodies.

More on Plastics and Tea Bags

There have been a number of articles on the web about plastic in tea bags and how much is released into our one cup of tea. Check out the link below for an article in Country Living by Emma-Louise Pritchard.

A study from McGill University in Canda had shocking finding. Some teabags are made from plastic including top brands. McGill found that one plastic tea bag releases around 11.6 billion microplastics and 3.1 billion smaller nanoplastic particles into the cup. Those, in turn, end up in the drinker's digestive system.

The only store brand mentioned that does not contain plastic in their tea bags is Aldi's black and green tea sold under the brand name **Benner**. Below is a link to the article published in the **Journal of Environmental Science & Technology**.

Plastic Bags Recycling Is Anybody Taking Them YES Publix and they actually recycle them - Story Below

Plastic bag recycling and reduction.

The recycling bins in front of our stores aren't the end for plastic bags—they're just the beginning. Follow the recycling journey of plastic bags from our recycling bins to the recycler's manufacturing facility.

What happens to my plastic bags?

When you put your recyclable plastic bags in the green bins outside your local Publix, you can count on us to make sure that bag finds its way to responsible recycling.



Plastic bags are not accepted through most local curbside recycling programs due to their flexible material. Soft plastics like single-use shopping bags and films can become "tanglers" and clog recycling

machinery used to recycle plastic bottles, containers, and other heavier gauge plastics. Making sure plastic bags stay out of the usual plastic recycling stream ensures that other plastics get recycled properly and without any problems.



That's where we come in—when the bins in front of our stores are full, the contents are sent back on a Publix truck to the nearest Publix Return Center. Our return centers compact the materials into bales and load them onto a trailer. When full, the recycler picks up the trailer and transports it back to their manufacturing facility for processing. Our plastic recyclers turn these bags into plastic pellets and sell them to manufacturers who use them to make things like new plastic bags, composite decking, fencing, benches, and more.



Doing more for the environment is as easy as bringing your plastic bags with you on your next grocery trip and letting Publix do the rest. Responsible plastic bag recycling is just another great way for us to do good together.

Plastic bag reduction.

At Publix, we believe we can do good together by reducing the use of paper and plastic bags. Our initiatives include:

- Instructing our front-service clerks on proper bagging techniques.
- Encouraging annual single-use bag reduction targets for every store.
- Encouraging customers to help make a difference for our environment by bringing reusable bags on shopping trips and opting for digital receipts.

A Seasonal doing good project involving one of our Legacy Pointe Residents

Meadowlark Lemon of the famous Harlem Globetrotters is considered the "Clown Prince of Basketball". Meadowlark joined the team in 1954 and played in more than 16,000 games in 100 countries. He was an awesome entertainer and brought joy to many people all over the world. You might think that basketball was his life focus, but his true passion was caring for underserved children.



Meadowlark and CEO Bill Pollakov, of Pollakov Financial Group, started a 501(c)3 called Bikes for Kids in 2002. Their goal was teaching the kids how to "Think Big, Work Hard, Be Kind, No Excuses". As a result, they could change the trajectory of their lives and they rewarded each of them with brand new bicycles. Each student would have learned how to responsibly look after their bike and be proud of their achievements.

The students selected to attend these classes are 3rd, 4th and 5th grade children in schools that had 80% Title 1 students. Most of these kids are victims of generational poverty.

Initially a book for 3rd graders was produced called "Dream Big, Make Good, I Promise!". At the beginning of the school year, the 3rd graders attend six weeks of classes focused on learning desirable character traits. The purpose is to teach these kids how to set goals by encouraging them to work toward those goals and telling them that they will be writing essays in competition for 3 new bicycles that will be awarded to the top essay writers.



None of the students thought that a big surprise was going to happen for all of them.

In October 2019 Bikes for Kids contacted Graham Ricks' company, ABCO Automation Inc., and said they needed a place and people to build 500 bikes for kids in Greensboro, NC. Because ABCO is a company that builds equipment for companies, they have large areas that are used for constructing some very large, specialized machines. Volunteers were quickly found and the expected date of Fed Ex delivering 500 unassembled bikes in boxes arrived. Very quickly the task began and on November 5, 2019, all bikes were assembled and ready to be delivered to 500 unexpecting students.

In the end all of the students are surprised when they learn that everyone is getting a new bike, showing them that having a big dream and working hard to achieve it PAYS OFF.

Every year the event takes place at ABCO and the number of bikes grows each year with more volunteers appearing to help make the magic happen. This year 1800 bikes were assembled and then delivered to the gymnasium at the University of NC in Greensboro where the kids gathered to see who the lucky 3 recipients will be.

The two companies you have learned about here are continuing to encourage students by expanding into junior high. From 2016 to 2022, hospitals for children saw a 116% increase in attempted suicides or self-injury. Hospitals now report that 25% of pediatric deaths come from suicide. The American Academy of Pediatrics has determined that "Increased exposure to social media has been associated with poor mental health in teenagers," deciding that teens who spend

five or more hours a day online are nearly twice as likely to have suicidal tendencies as those who spent less than an hour."

Common Sense Media reported in 2019: Children, ages 13 to 18, spend an average of 7 hours 22 minutes per day on social media. To address this crisis "The Dream Guide" was created. It is a self-administered tool designed to help junior and senior high students find, define and determine their dream. Its purpose is to help participants learn how to be a hero, make a difference in the world, and create a life filled with intention and meaning.



OUR INTELLIGENCE (OI) versus ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) by Frank Russo

For the last three months we talked briefly about the levels of **Artificial Intelligence (AI)**

Level One – referred to as 'Narrow or weak Al i.e. limited to specific tasks Level Two - Often called General Al is still directed by Ol but Al can begin to analyze data.

Level Three - Al is learning to play chess at Level three.. But for now, this advanced **Al** is still a scientific dream at level three.

This month we are going to take off into the world of 'sci-fi' or maybe it won't be Science Fiction but AI is starting to become II (Intergalactic Investigation).

Before looking at **II** (Intergalactic Investigation), which is way beyond anything that is currently available, let's take a quick look at what is happening today as we are led into the future. What is currently dominating the world of AI.

The answer is that way too many experiments are being done involving Al and using different approaches as to how to get Al to work in millions of different scenarios. Here is just a sample of the huge range of Al projects from using Al to explore space to using Al to replace a cook in the kitchen, one that does not follow a script but one that can be creative looking in the refrigerator and cabinets and then decide on what to make for supper based on what is at hand.

A couple of years ago ChatGPT arrived on the scene. This is a user-friendly interface for a "large language model" (LLM). It was called GPT-3. That computer program has generated a growing number of other LLMs, It is packed with all kinds of information to help it weigh possibilities in performing a task. The newly released ChatGPT 4 has over 1 trillion possibilities.

So that's the current situation. Robot computers are being packed with enough information to get them to weigh all possibilities and then perform a task or a solution to a scientific problem. Hopefully the robotic cook will be able to find the ingredients for supper.

Now on to the future, future of II (Intergalactic Investigation) which is only in my imagination. Here is my question: "Will II (Intergalactic Investigation) ever be able to pull together enough of the current AI experiments to send 'forever' spaceships like Voyager I and II with the DNA building blocks for human life contained in the space craft to be assemble at some point using an advanced printer protein filled building block?"

Enough of II for now. But I bet that someone in someplace is thinking about it.

Gardening on your balcony

Many Legacy Pointe residents would like to grow something but do not want to garden outside. So, the Gardener's Corner will try to offer suggestions for things you can grow on your balcony.

If you are new to gardening let's start off easily. How about a tomato plant, a pepper plant, 2 green bean plants, and some lettuce plants.

The start time is sometime in late January when it warms up a bit.

Here is what you will need.

- 1. Several small dixie cups with a couple of drainage holes in the bottom.
- 2. A small container of potting soil.
- 3. A tray or baking pan to set the dixie cups into.
- 4. Seeds for the following: 2 for peppers and 2 for grape tomatoes.
- 5. Four seeds for the following green beans.
- 6. Four to Six seeds for the lettuce (depending on the kind of lettuce you like).
- 7. Some type of spray bottle.

That is all you need to get started.

Fill each dixie cup ¾ to the top with potting soil.

- Put 2 seeds in each cup ex: 2 pepper seeds in one cup, 2 tomato seeds in one cup, 2 green bean seeds in each of 2 cups, all seeds for lettuce in one cup.
- Water from your spray bottle. Keep soil moist but not wet.
- Find the sunniest spot on your balcony or windowsill and set your tray down.
- Cover at night if it gets cold. Check the soil daily to see if it needs to be sprayed with water.
- You do not need a 'grow light'.
- Potting soil and garden can be purchased at ACE hardware with soil in smaller containers and more reasonably priced X.
- NOTE do not go out and buy seeds. Garden club members will lend you seeds.

Contact Frank Russo at 407-341-7622 to ask for help and seeds.

Here is what you will need near the end of January. (**DO NOT SPEND MUCH MONEY**)

You will need a large pot to transfer seedlings. (Buy buckets at Dollar Tree based on the number of seeds you are transplanting. These cost \$1.25 each versus what you would spend at a nursery which could cost \$10 each. Punch 3 holes in the bottom of each bucket for drainage and you have your pot for growing each of your plants.

Fun Recipe for French Toast Hong Kong Style With a secret ingredient



Why would you ever need a recipe for 'French toast'. It is easy! A couple of eggs, some sliced bread, a little milk or cream, a fry pan and some maple syrup. And after 5 minutes you have French toast. Well yes, but how boring?

First, be adventuresome. Decide "Do I want a 'French toast sandwich', or French toast muffins, or stuffed French toast, or overnight French Toast or Hong Kong French toast?"

Try this Hong Kong 'French toast recipe by <u>Christie Lai</u> Ingredients for one French toast sandwich

- 3 pieces milk bread or any square shaped white bread
- 4 tablespoon smooth peanut butter or substitute with Nutella, or any nut butter of your choice
- 1 large egg beaten
- 1/2 1 cup vegetable oil or any neutral oil

Toppings: 2 tablespoon butter as needed

· sweetened condensed milk, or sub with honey or maple syrup

Instructions

Just before starting the instructions below do the following

In a large heavy bottomed pan, heat vegetable oil over low-medium heat (level 4 out of 10 on the dial or around 300 F).

- 1. For one sandwich, (using 3 slices of bread) evenly spread a layer of peanut butter on two slices of the bread from edge to edge. Leave 1 slice of bread without peanut butter.
- 2. Place the two slices with peanut butter on top of each other with the peanut butter facing upwards. Place the last slice on top and lightly push down so it sticks together as one sandwich. Repeat step 1 and 2 for another serving of toast.
- 3. Slice off the crusts (if you prefer) of the sandwich with a bread knife to create a square. This allows the bread to absorb as much age mixture as possible
- 4. In a shallow bowl, beat the egg(s) until smooth.
- 5. Lightly coat sandwiches in the beaten egg by laying them down on each side and then standing them up on all four sides. Don't overcoat it or it'll get mushy and hard to handle.
- 6. Rest the sandwiches vertically on a plate and then (using tongs)carefully lower the sandwich into the hot oil.
- 7. Fry on all sides until golden brown (30 seconds on the sides and 1-2 minutes on the larger surface areas). Repeat the frying process for another sandwich. Enjoy hot with butter and condensed milk or honey, or maple syrup






