This month as promised the LP **Independent Times** will continue the industry's charade on our burden to clean up their mess. This time a key corporate lawyer has issued a dire warning to the companies involved in the production of plastic.

Our Editorial for the Month of July

The Chemical Companies have been caught! Now What?

The New York Times had this warning in a story written by Hiroko Tabuchi Lawyers to Plastics Makers: Prepare for 'Astronomical' PFAS Lawsuits

Brian Gross of the law firm MG+M warned the chemical companies that there are scores of litigations coming that will "Dwarf anything related to the asbestos" lawsuits. The initial lawsuits have been brought by numerous cities and states that are trying to clean up plastic residue from their drinking water. The residue is from the PFAS chemical compounds that cannot be broken down and end up as micro and nano plastic particles in everything, for example in our food, landfills, drinking water, etc.

"Last year, 3M agreed to pay \$10 billion to water utilities across the United States to pay for clean-up to those municipalities who has requested it".

PFAS were first synthesized by DuPont in the 1940s. This synthesization led to the development of Teflon pans by DuPont and 3 M's Scotchgard fabric protector.

Who knew What

As early as 1961 manufacturers knew of adverse health effects due to PFAS chemical compounds. But not too much scientific study was conducted until DuPont was fined \$10 million in 2005 because they knew the dangers of PFAS but failed to warn the public.

One attorney, Emily Lamond, from the Law Firm Cole Schotz, which specializes in these cases said "Take tobacco, asbestos, MTBE, combine them and I still think that we are going to see much more PFAS litigation.

Scientific research is still in its infancy on these chemicals. But wait and see these fined will mount ups and will be in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

What should we do?

The worst thing is to just sit around and wait. Act now. Stop buying water in plastic bottles, stop using single use plastic everything from shopping bags to plastic wrap, stop storing food in plastic containers.

Plastic has already leeched into our bodies. Protect yourself while there is still time.

Next month what technology is doing to change how we clean up the industry's plastic mess.

Pickleball Courts Are Coming Soon! by Graham Ricks

We are thrilled to announce that our community will soon be home to new pickleball courts! This exciting development is set to enhance our recreational facilities and provide a fantastic venue for both seasoned players and newcomers to the sport. Here are two questions we have been asked.

When Will the Courts Be Finished?

Construction on the pickleball courts began in May 2024. The area was cleared of sod and sprinkler lines to make way for the courts. To prevent flooding, dirt and limerock were

trucked in and compacted with a roller. The area was then paved asphalt, which was allowed to weeks.

Currently, two important steps are

2. An acrylic resurfacer is being applied to the asphalt to correct any imperfections in the surface.

Before the courts can receive their final coats of paint, sidewalks must be installed up to the court surface. Josh Gorniak is working to select a contractor for the sidewalk installation. Once the sidewalks are in place, the courts will receive two coats of sand-filled acrylic, the nets will be installed, and the cleared area around the courts will be landscaped to make the grounds attractive.

We are hopeful that the courts will be complete this month. Get ready to enjoy some exciting pickleball action soon!



Butterflies typically only live for 2-4 weeks and the ones only a few days. Monarchs and Mourning the exception and can survive for as long as 9 months.

It has been determined that butterflies can see up to 10-12 feet. They do not see all the colors we see but they do see ultraviolet colors that we do not see! In fact, it is thought that they may even have ultraviolet marking on their wings to help them identify each other including a possible mate.

These insects are most comfortable in temperatures of 82 to 100 degrees Fahrenheit. On cooler days they must bask in the sun or shiver to warm up their flight muscles.

When adults begin to emerge from their chrysalis, the proboscis (mouthpiece) is in two pieces and to survive, they must assemble it quickly to be able to drink their liquid only meals.

Recycling by Mitch Mitchell

This is your July update on existing recycling programs and new initiatives that are getting underway. A HUGE thank you to all of you who are recycling away and to those who are doing the work to make it happen!

On August 1st Legacy Pointe will put a new "official" recycling effort into place. We will update how this program may affect the recycling programs currently underway as we get more information. For the most part, it is likely to increase the number of products being recycled above and beyond the current efforts. At present it currently appears from information received that the cost of this additional service may be relatively minimal on a monthly basis; however, if there should be substantial additional costs incurred for these services, we as a community will need to examine the cost vs. benefit of these additional services.

1. Aluminum cans. Recycling of aluminum cans continues at a vigorous pace! Thus far the IL 3rd Floor aluminum canning factory continues to produce cans at a near-alarming rate and is the undeniable IL championship floor! Production there remains highly focused on Coke products and an unknown variety of root beer (no...NOT Budweiser!). (NOTICE: Only aluminum cans can be recycled — no pet food cans, pie plates, aluminum foil, etc.)

2. Large plastic meal containers. The black/clear covered meal boxes that come out of the kitchen are being recycled in large numbers and are going to Hope Helps here in Oviedo. Some of the containers are being used by their food pantry; the remainder are being sold (quickly!) out of their store. As of mid June, 1275 of them have been recycled in this manner. We recycle and Hope Helps receives charitable contributions. These plastic meal containers can be placed in the bottom left cabinet in the unit outside the gym. NOTICE: Meal containers that are cut into separate top and bottom pieces cannot be recycled to Hope Helps and can only be sent out as recycled plastic. We are leaving some of these severed boxes in the cabinet if you would like to use already cut containers and save intact ones for Charity use.

3. Re-Use Copy Paper. Renata and our wonderful dining room staff are making the effort to collect dated menu pages from both the Main Dining Room and the Assisted Living Dining Room. Much of this copy paper is in excellent condition for re-use for onesided "junk" printing. Many of us print items for temporary or non record copy uses - or for committee use - and this copy paper is perfect for this. MAKE USE OF THIS **RESOURCE AND SAVE THE "GOOD STUFF" FOR WHEN IT'S REALLY NEEDED!** This paper can be found in a basket located on the bottom shelf in the cubby

unit for the villas—located in the small ante room that leads into the auditorium (just off the main rotunda).

4. Old eyeglasses, eyeglass frames, lenses and eyeglass cases. Don't just discard any of these! The Lions Club has an EXTENSIVE program to recycle these in many ways. All of these components can be placed in the two Lions Club boxes located on a shelf in the cubby unit for the Villas. POC: Les Tandler

5. Hearing aids. Just like the eyeglasses, the Lions Club has a companion program to use unneeded hearing aids for the needy. Hearing aids can be placed in the same containers used for eveglasses. POC: Les Tandler

6. Batteries. Although all the Media attention is on Lithium and Alkaline batteries, all batteries, including those in your phone, watches, tools, etc., contain some form of metal which then corrodes and leeches into the environment. You can drop your batteries off here in Legacy Pointe in the top right drawer in the cabinet next to the door into the IL exercise room (gym).

7. Printer cartridges. DO NOT THROW YOUR USED PRINTER CARTRIDGES

AWAY! These cartridges are now being recycled through Staples and the proceeds are being used to supply cartridges and other print supplies to Forward Paths Inc. in Leesburg, FL. Forward Paths works with the young adults who age-out of foster care at 18 years old, and usually end up out on the streets. Please place any printer cartridges you are getting rid of in the same drawer the used batteries are collected in. Joe Solymossy takes the cartridges to Staples for Forward Paths.

8. Electronics. Cell phones, iPads, iPods, MP3 players, DVD players, flat screen TV or computer screens, laptops, etc. SHOULD NEVER be put into the normal trash. Today you can take the portable electronic items to Best Buy or to Staples. If you have a Staples Rewards account (free to set up) you can get \$5.00 per one returned item each month and the points do not expire. As an alternative, Forward Paths, Inc has a rewards account and Joe does recycle small electronics under their account. If interested, talk to Joe. POC: Joe Solymossy

9. Newspapers/paper. We witness a huge waste of paper here. Many people are taking their paper to recycle at Publix stores or at the Oviedo recycling point in the City Hall area. For the time being please place your newspaper material with the cardboard in the trash rooms.

POC: Volunteer needed! We need YOU!!!

10. **Plastic/plastic bottles**. A continuing issue. There is almost no market for recycled plastics, while at the same time plastic trash poses some of the most severe long-term risk to the environment and danger to living life forms (that includes us!!). At this point a few of us who discover items marked as noted below pick them up out of the trash rooms if convenient for us. Residents can drop them at the Oviedo recycling point or at Publix stores.

NOTICE: <u>Plastic items (bottles, containers, some toothpaste tubes, Legacy Pointe</u> <u>meal containers, etc.) with the number "1, 2 or 5" in the recycling symbol on the</u> <u>bottom of the container and plastic bags can be recycled. The vexing part is that</u> <u>most other plastics are not currently recycled and go to land fill</u>.

11. Glass bottles/containers. Currently there is not much of a call for glass bottles. At least when these items go into the ground no harm is done and, in fact, they give future generations a reason to dig in the ground for "artifacts!"

<u>As a final note</u>. All of these efforts have arisen on the basis of resident thoughts and suggestions so that we can do our small part to save and recycle resources and, in some minor way AID OUR AILING PLANET. These programs are largely autonomous in nature—not interlinked with others. Some of these projects already have champions who are taking them in hand. Some others still don't. I will be looking to find able stewards for those that don't, as well as a "Recycling Czar" to act as an overall spokesperson and "pen pal" for these efforts.




The Legacy Pointe Book Club


