We enjoyed all the different 'Earth Day' events, especially the information tables where we were well informed about the threats that our planet is under and the butterfly garden where we learned about the Monarch Butterfly and other butterflies, hummingbirds, etc.

So, to keep Earth Day alive throughout 2024, the Legacy Pointe Independent Times will bring you monthly reminders about what you can do to make our planet bright blue and our air free from pollutants.

For the month of May, we will talk about this year's **Earth Day theme "Planet vs Plastics".** We are a community of senior residents living at Legacy Pointe. What can we do?

Lets start with what is already happening in our community:

- 1. We can recycle Aluminum Cans we saw the L.P. Kan, Kan dancers showing how they crushed them. So, save all your aluminum cans and bring them to the trash room on each floor where there is a container for therm.
- 2. We can recycle Cardboard **Do Not** throw it down the trash bin it will jam everything up. Pile it in the trash room. Please make sure all cardboard is clean, especially pizza boxes.
- 3. Do not throw your batteries or electronics in the trash, we will talk about what to do with these, next month.
- 4. Look for this symbol:



Styrofoam, Yes, we can recycle these cups, plates, dining room and bistro containers Look for the number 6 on these containers. Save them and bring them to Publix where they can be placed in the Styrofoam bin. There are dozens of residents going to Publix each week and if you cannot get there, someone will take your recyclables.

We are starting to hear a lot about "Plastics" The threat is described in hundreds of scholarly papers, thousands of articles on the web and specials on TV. Recently investigative journalists have turned up the heat on the chemical and oil companies. These companies have known about the dangers of plastic both the possible pollution with nanoplastics and the problem of trying to recycle plastic. They have been involved in a campaign of possible cover-up.

And we have heard it all before. We all are old enough to remember the chemical companies trying to defend the use of DDT as harmless – until Rachael Carson and her book, the **Silent Spring**, came along. Then we had the cigarette companies for years running commercials and ads in journals, newspapers, magazines, billboards, etc. about the pleasures of smoking. Remember the doctor smoking, to relax after a hard day. Oh! and there was the Marlboro Man smoking out in the fresh air. What could be better!

Again, playing on the 'age card' remember President Dwight D. Eisenhower in part of his farewell speech. He spoke about the dangers of the emerging military industrial complex. The Second World War and the Korean War had brought Industry and the Military together which relationship produced a powerful lobbying group. Now throughout the world each country, large or small, has this lobbying group as well as many others.

In the past business groups have lobbying political groups whose purpose is to protect them. And again, that is what is happening with the chemical and oil companies.

The third annual Legacy Pointe at UCF invitational regatta was held on 28 August 2024 on Edward's Pond. This regatta was comprised of 11 Dragon Force 65 radio-controlled sailboats, six sailors from the Oviedo RC Sailors and five from the LP Drifters sailing clubs. Practice and boat trimming ran from 10:30 to 11:00 AM and race heats started at around 11. This year's regatta consisted of eight heats with the Oviedo club winning both of the 2 First Place trophies, one for A+ sails and one for A sails, second place for class A sails also went to the Oviedo club. The regatta is being run during the Kentucky Derby week prior to the Derby. Next year's regatta will award 1st, 2nd and 3rd place trophies and consist of A class sails only. The Legacy Pointe sailors are Frank Armetta, Ray Blake, Dick Huff, Tony Mennella, Edward North, Les Tandler and Dennis Wood. If anyone is interested in joining the Legacy Pointe club, you can contact any of the current members for information.

The Dragon Force 65 boat is the most popular RC sailboat worldwide with somewhere between 30,000 and 40,000 sold. The cost of a complete kit with radio and receiver, sails and everything to start sailing currently costing \$315.00. Entry level boats come with class A sails only, but three additional sail sizes are available for different wind conditions. The overall boat length is 26 inches and 53 inches tall, keel to tip of the mast. Various decals are available to personalize your boat and make it easier to identify when sailing. The global DF 65 regatta is being held in Sweden this month and runs 5 days in length and a \$325 dollar entry fee. The winner will be the World Champion and by the way the US National champion is a member of the Oviedo club.


The Fifth of May came to L.P as part of a week that featured and afternoon of High Tea and the running of the roses at the Kentucky Derby.

I have come across something called Auracast. It is essentially Bluetooth, but One to Many. A single transmitter is less then \$100 and would easily cover the auditorium. There are not many available yet as it is just new and I am trying to find a local user that I can talk to about it and check it out. It is being incorporated into hearing aids already and existing headphones/earbuds BT 5.2 or greater are or can be made compatible with it.

During the last few months, The RC Communications Committee, Technology Subcommittee has been looking at ways technology can enhance our ways to communicate. Meanwhile the Health and Wellness Committee has been talking about using technology to enhance the hearing capabilities for individuals using hearing aids. One of those would involve the installation of a hearing loop in our auditorium. The capital planning, budgeting, approval and installation process may approve it for a 2025-2026 expenditure.

The technology class scheduled on May 21 at 2 pm will be on the use of the (New) Edge Browser, and Google Chrome Browser. In addition, I am inviting anyone who has difficulty hearing our normal presentations in the auditorium to come to this session. I especially invite all of you who have hearing enhancement implements. We are going to test the improvement in hearing in our auditorium through the use of Zoom. If you want to come to the class and test the use of Zoom, you will need a cell phone that has Bluetooth and has the Zoom application loaded on the phone. In addition, your hearing aids should be able to pair to that phone. If you are not familiar with this process, talk to me before this session. The first 15 minutes of the class we will ensure that all of you will be able to hear my presentation through your cell phone and thus directly into your hearing aids. I "read" books on audio and the sound is very crisp and clear, whereas the sound without my phone is generally not as clear. This process might be an alternate way to address some of the hearing issues.--

HEALTH AND MORE

Awareness is a Key to Good Health Research

Are some of our health challenges related to certain herbicides, particularly those containing glyphosates?

Legacy Pointe has some residents that are gluten intolerant and need to be very careful about what they eat. Some of the symptoms include skin rashes, diarrhea, nausea, anemia and depression. Gluten can create nutritional deficiencies that may lead to thyroid disease, kidney failure and cancer. In recent years nutritional deficiencies have noticeably increased in the United States.

There are studies showing a possible connection between gluten intolerance and glyphosates, the active ingredient in Roundup. Farmers spray it on crops to eliminate the weed population. Fish that are exposed to glyphosate get digestive issues that create problems with gut bacteria, which is what happens with gluten intolerance.

The American company Monsanto developed glyphosates in 1974. "The German company Bayer A.G. bought Monsanto in 2018, and tens of thousands of lawsuits have been filed against the company by people claiming that Roundup and other glyphosate-based herbicides caused their cancer, especially non-Hodgkin lymphoma."

In 2015, the part of the World Health Organization that studies cancer stated that glyphosates were "probably carcinogenic to humans." Exposure to glyphosate-based weed killers used on lawns and sidewalks can come from inhalation, skin contact or eye exposure.

As of 2023, "Glyphosate has been or will soon be banned in at least 10 countries, including

Mexico, Germany, Saudi Arabia, and Vietnam, and at least 15 others have restricted its use, according to Human Rights Watch. Individual cities and counties, including Los Angeles, Seattle, Miami, Baltimore, Austin, and Portland, have taken action to restrict or ban glyphosate, as have some states."

Our Book for May is called "Next Year in Havana" by Chanel Cleeton




